WHERE WE HUNT?

We hunt the Red Stag near to Roxburgh, NZ on the South Island in the rolling hills surrounding the area. The mountains of the Southern Alps are the hunting locations for Tahr and Chamois. The main hunting site for Tahr is located in the Canterbury Region, near Mount Cook. The Chamois hunting is based from the Glenorchy area in the beautiful Southern Alps, Glenorchy is a short 45-minute drive from the Queenstown Airport. All areas are approximately 3-4 hours of drive time to reach the base location. A helicopter will round trip fly the hunters to the hunting grounds, which is included in the trip. This will maximize the hunting time, as it is typically a 2-3 day hike into the remote hunting areas.

For Tahr and Chamois We offer two different hunting options in order to meet the needs and desires of the hunter. We understand that different hunters have different fitness levels and comfort levels. We have ensured that we have an option that appeals to both.

Our first offer is a remote spike camp high up in the mountain approximately above 9000 foot in elevation. Here the hunter and guide are helicoptered into the remote area where they get the chance to hunt a huge variety of Tahr and then camp out each night. For this hunt, a helicopter is used to deliver them to the area and then to pick them up at the end of the hunt once they have their animal. This has been designed for the hunter that lives for the wild and enjoys the remoteness of the rugged mountain range.

Our second offer is for a hunter that isn't quite as able or willing to camp in the outdoors, but still wants to secure a beautiful animal. For this hunter we can offer fly chopper, we will try to shoot a Tahr and Chamois from chopper. An extra fee will apply to shoot the animals from the chopper, due to the amount of fuel consumed and the dangerous nature of this hunt.



Red Stag

New Zealand's Red Stag are the most sought-after stag in the world, as an outcome of their distinctive large body and antler mass. The rut/roar for these breath-taking animals starts in March and goes through to late April. During this time the stags are very vocal, making it a very electrifying experience for both the hunter and their guide.

In New Zealand it is impossible to have a free-range block with no fencing, and to still be able to guarantee the size of the animals in the area. Smaller free-range bush stags are available, but these trophies are considerably smaller than the stags grown for their massive antlers.

Although it does have a boundary fence, we can assure you that it is an extensive area, full of natural flora and a rugged terrain that will challenge the hunter and the guide. Animals can be hiding in valleys, amongst scrub or situated at the top of peaks, making it an exhilarating hunt for all involved.

Bull Tahr

The Bull Tahr is known to be one of the most sought-after mountain animals in the South Pacific. Originally from the highest peaks of the Himalayas, Tahr were released onto New Zealand's highest mountain, Mount Cook, only 13 Tahr were released into the environment, but due to the glacial conditions, they shortly started breeding with numbers rapidly increasing.

Tahr are known not only for their intriguing horn, but for their lion like mane, thick coat and large shoulders, making them one of the most unique mountain goats in the world. The captivating mountain kings can weigh up to 300lbs, with their coats being their thickest during the rut. The rut runs from May to August and we recommend that if you are able to book your hunt during this time, to do so, as this is when hunts are slightly easier, as the bulls come down from the top of the mountains to be with the nanny's. Although we recommend the rut as the best conditions, hunts are still run successfully out of this time, with hunts being carried out from March through September. Winter conditions after June, can make the hunting conditions very difficult, especially for the helicopters to fly into the mountains.

One of the major reasons for hunters wanting to hunt these magnificent animals is due to the untamed and challenging environment in which they live in. Tahr are a remarkable agile animal, being found at the top of peaks, on scree slips and on glaciers areas.

Chamois

New Zealand Chamois were released in the mountains near Mount Cook in 1907, three years after the introduction of the Bull Tahr. Only 11 were released at this time, but like the Tahr, they found their environment very accommodating, and have breed at a rapid rate. After their introduction, New Zealand became the only country where you can hunt free range Chamois outside of the Middle East and Europe. These animals to this day are only found in the South Island, just like the Bull Tahr, making them a unique animal.

Chamois like Tahr, is a stunning addition to any trophy room. Both the buck and doe carry horns, growing almost vertically with a curve near the end leading to a sharp hook. The buck is often more sought after by the hunter as they are a slightly bigger animal with a thicker horn and an average full-grown weight of 90lbs. The rut for the Chamois is slightly different to the Tahr as it starts earlier, going from April to June. During this time the Chamois gain a thicker coat, and the bucks become slightly easier to hunt as they come down lower into scrub and around the creeks where the does are situated.

The hunt for Chamois is one that is challenging but very rewarding, they can be found feeding down in creek beds or up the sides of mountains up to 9000 feet. Unlike the Tahr, they do prefer hiding in thick alpine scrub, rather than spending their time of mountain peaks. Chamois are known for their amazing eyesight making it a very challenging animal to hunt as the stalk of the animal takes vast amount of skill to avoid being seen.

Waterfowl :

The Waterfowl consists of a selection of Paradise Ducks, Mallard Ducks, Grey Ducks, Australian Shoveler Ducks, and Black Swans.

The Paradise Duck is only found in New Zealand, they are larger than a Mallard with the female having a white head and a chestnut colored body, and the male being black all over.

This selection of birds allows for a great day of fun. Waterfowl is another hunt that is easily accessible to all ages. A license is required for Waterfowl hunting and is an additional \$96 USD for the year or \$22 USD per day.

Best Caliber For Red Stag Hunting

Most of our Red Stag deer hunters use cartridges like the 7mm Remington Magnum, .30-06 Springfield, and the .300 Winchester Magnum. Though they are not quite as large as Elk, Red Deer are still relatively big animals. They can also be very shy, so you need to make the most out of the shot opportunities you get when Red Deer hunting. For this reason, we highly recommend bringing a rifle that you are familiar with and shoot accurately, even if it is chambered in a smaller caliber. Be prepared to take a shot in the 50-250 yard range. Chamois and Tahr shots could be out to 450 yards, but we prefer to stalk them closer within the 350 yard range.

Season for Each Species

Red Stag Mid-February – August / Best Dates May 02nd to 08th

Tahr May – August

Chamois May – August

Waterfowl first weekend in May – July

Terms & Payment Methods:

- ✚ All the prices are in USD
- ✚ We require a deposit of 50% in advance to book your hunt.
- ✚ The remaining is required 60 days before the hunt. You can move your hunt for the next year (if the client has an emergency)
- ✚ All deposits are non-refundable, you can pass your deposit to another hunter.
- ✚ The probability of success for the 100% for Red Stag, Tahr and Chamois rates are above 80% Weather conditions and the hunter abilities/physical shape play important factors in success.
- ✚ The company is not responsible for abrupt climate changes, which could cause partial or total suspension of the hunt
- ✚ Any animal shot or wounded and No recovered is considered harvest
- ✚ Non-hunters are charged \$300 USD per day


